

FIRST CLASS FACILITIES

The Donoher Basketball Center, named for UD's winningest basketball coach Don Donoher, is

a state-of-the-art structure that elevates both the University of Dayton's men's and women's basketball programs to the next level.

Technology is at the very core of the Center's distinctiveness. An ESPN-style, six-screen theater wall just inside the entrance makes it crystal clear from the initial impression that UD understands the necessity of bringing current technologgy to bear on competitive performance.

One of UD's most prominent alumni, high-tech entrepreneur John McHale and his wife Christine Mattsson,

contributed more than a third of the Center's \$4.3 million cost. The name is a nod to the past; the Center itself is clear evidence of the University's intention to stake out a leadership position at the intersection of college basketball and technology to propel the Flyers to championship performance.

ATHLETIC PRACTICE FACILITY




University of Dayton basketball got a shot in the arm this summer when the Flyers opened their new on-campus practice facility during the summer of 2007. While the epicenter of Dayton basketball will remain the University of Dayton Arena, the new facility gives UD a dedicated on-campus space for individual instruction sessions, walk-throughs, open gyms, and a place for players to simply be able to work on their games when it fits their schedule.

When the University opened its beautiful new \$25.3 million RecPlex last year, it not only filled a need for the campus community, but created an opportunity for the Athletics Division to greatly improve its on-campus indoor practice space by renovating the vacated campus rec center and creating a new Athletics Practice Facility.

Collins Gym received a new multipurpose surface suitable for indoor practices for track, volleyball, baseball, tennis, softball and football as well as conditioning sessions for all sports.





In addition, the former Lackner Natatorium pool was filled in, the old Tom Blackburn Court was moved from the Arena to campus (a new Tom Blackburn court was installed at UD Arena for the 2007-08 season) and the Flyers began using their "home away from home" in August.

The 30-year-old facade will be spruced up in 2008 to meet the architectural standards developed through the University of Dayton Campus Master Plan.

Future phases of renovation of the remaining unused spaces could include updating or expanding locker room space, training rooms, weight rooms, conditioning centers and new offices. The proximity of the facility to core campus also sends a strong message to prospective student-athletes about UD's commitment to developing their talents both on-and-off the court.

The UD will community continue to use the Collins Gym for administrative luncheons, Christmas on Campus, the Stander Symposium, the Science Fair and other campus events.




LAUREN MCCORMICK - TRACK AND FIELD

MEET THE COACHES

Hard-working. Compassionate. Dedicated. These are just a few words that come to mind when talking with Jim Jabir. On April 8, 2003, the University of Dayton introduced Jabir as the women's basketball team's eighth head coach and first male head coach in the history of the program.

The Flyers have been one of the most improved teams in the nation under the direction of Jabir. UD had the fourth best single-season turnaround in the nation in the 2004-05 season with an improvement of nine wins over the previous campaign. Jabir and Dayton continued the trend in 2005-06 with an improvement of five more wins, giving UD the second best improvement over a two-year span in the nation.

"I am going to be the hardest working coach out there," states Jabir. "I want people to fear playing the University of Dayton."

The 2005-06 season also saw two different Flyers earn Atlantic 10 All-Conference accolades as UD finished sixth in a conference that sent five teams to postseason play. Dayton also advanced to the Quarterfinals of the A-10 Tournament and finished with a winning record for the first time in five years.

UD returned to the Atlantic 10 Quarterfinals at the conclusion of the 2006-07 season marking the third time in school history that the Flyers had advanced past their opening round in the Atlantic 10 Tournament. Dayton played close games throughout the 2006-07 campaign as 15 of its 31 games were decided by single digits despite having just one senior in the starting lineup.

Jabir came to UD after spending one season as an assistant at Colorado. In his last season at CU, the Buffaloes (24-8) advanced to the Sweet Sixteen of the NCAA Tournament and were ranked as high as 23rd in the ESPN/Coaches' Poll and 24th in the Associated Press Poll. Jabir was primarily responsible for the development of CU's post players, including the Buffaloes' first-ever First Team All-Big 12 selection.

Jabir had been a head coach for 16 seasons prior to coaching at CU with an all-time career mark of 220-223. His broad coaching experience ranges from the Big East Conference to the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference.

The Brooklyn, NY native began his coaching career as an assistant at Nazareth College (1984-85) and at Buffalo State (1985-86). Jabir was instrumental in leading the Bengals to a 23-3 slate, the SUNYAC title, a 22-game winning streak, an NCAA regional tournament appearance and a national ranking (No. 3) during the 1985-86 season.


After one season as an assistant, Jabir became the head coach at Buffalo State during the 1986-87 season at the age of 24. He led that team to a 14-11 record and guided the Bengals to the State University of New York Athletic Conference (SUNYAC) Championship and an appearance in the Division III Tournament.

Jabir matriculated to Siena College from Buffalo State, where he served as the head coach of the Saints for three seasons (1987-90) and compiled a 50-29 record. Jabir's teams posted three consecutive winning seasons. In his first season, Jabir was responsible for the development of Siena's first-ever Freshman All-American.

After his stint at Siena, Jabir spent six years at Marquette University becoming one of the most successful coaches in the history of the program, elevating the Golden Eagles into the national spotlight. After posting a 7-20 record during his inaugural year (1990-91) at Marquette, Jabir guided his team to four consecutive winning seasons, two 20-plus winning seasons and three post-season appearances, including back-to-back bids to the NCAA Tournament. In 1994-95, Marquette won the Great Midwest Conference Tournament, the first tournament championship in school history. This followed the 1993-94 campaign in which Jabir compiled a program-best 22-7 overall record and its first trip to the NCAA Tournament.

Before his stint at Colorado, Jabir was at the helm of Providence College for six seasons, 1996-2002. During his last three years, the Friars' record improved with each season and in his final season, the Friars finished 13-15 overall and eighth of 14 schools in the prestigious Big East, its highest finish ever since the Big East went to a one division format.

Jabir was a two-time Reebok/Great Midwest Conference Coach of the Year while at Marquette. Jabir is a 1984 graduate of Nazareth College in Rochester, New York, where he received a degree in English. He also earned his Masters degree in Student Personnel Administration from Buffalo State in 1986. Jabir and his wife Kathy have three children, Lauren, Shane and Jackson.



The University of Dayton welcomed Susan Blauser as an assistant coach on May 11, 2006. Blauser joined Jim Jabir's staff at UD from Akron where she served as an assistant for two seasons.

"Susan has a great personality," Jabir said. "She is outgoing and very hard working. Susan brings a lot of energy and she is a good fit for our program."

Blauser helped Jim Jabir to sign the 29th best recruiting class in 2007 according to the Blue Star Report. As the recruiting coordinator for the 2008 class, she was able to sign the No. 10 forward in the class according to Hoopgurlz recruiting service. Along with recruiting, Susan's primary duties include game preparation, academic progress of the team, equipment, and she serves as the Jim Jabir Camp Director. The Fighting Illini (23-11) spent most of the 1999-00 season ranked in the top 10 and advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

Blauser played her freshman and sophomore seasons at Rutgers where she was named to the Big East All-Rookie team in 1996 and the Rutgers Most Valuable Player in 1997. She was named the Scarlet Knights' Most Courageous Player both years on the roster and was a team captain as a



Lesley Dickinson started at Dayton as an assistant coach on July 15, 2007. She graduated from James Madison University in May 2007 after leading the Dukes to their third straight postseason appearance.

Dickinson was a three-time All-Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) selection for the Dukes. The 2006-07 CAA Women's Basketball Scholar-Athlete of the Year was awarded a NCAA Women's Enhancement Postgraduate Scholarship for Careers in Athletics. She was also named to the ESPN The Magazine All-District Second Team twice and was an Arthur Ashe Jr. Sports Scholar three times. The three-time Dean's List member was selected to Nike's "So You Want to Be a Coach" program following her playing career.

"I feel that Lesley will be a great coach for us at Dayton," Jabir said. "She is enthusiastic and wants to add to her knowledge of the game. She also brings a great passion for everything she does."

Dickinson was the second fastest player in school history to reach 1,000 career points. She reached the milestone in just 68 career games and finished second on the JMU scoring list with 1,616 career points. Dickinson averaged 10.8 points per game, 3.3 rebounds per game and 2.1 assists per game while playing 30.6 minutes per contest in her final collegiate season.

The 5-10 guard excelled at the free throw line throughout her career and finished with a James Madison record 457 makes from the charity stripe - 60 more than the next closest player. Dickinson started her career by being named the 2003-04 CAA Rookie of the Year after breaking JMU freshman records for games started, double-figure scoring games, points, field goals made and attempted, free throws made and attempted and minutes played.

Dickinson is originally from Queens Village, NY where she played for prep power Christ the King High School, which was ranked seventh in the final USA Today Coaches Poll her senior season. She was a 2003 New York Daily News First team selection and the MVP of the 2003 Slam Jam Championship Game while also leading Christ the King to three Brooklyn/Queens Catholic High School Athletic Association Championships.

Frank Goldsberry, who coached at Chaminade-Julienne High School in Dayton from 1996-2003, was responsible for guiding the Eagles to national prominence in high school girls basketball. Goldsberry also served as the head boys basketball coach at Tippecanoe High School for 13 years (1979-92) where he tallied a 165-112 record. While at Tippecanoe, Goldsberry was named Southwestern Rivers Coach of the Year on four occassions.

Goldsberry graduated from Ball State University with a degree in Education. He went on to receive his master's degree in computer science from the University of Dayton.


He also has worked as a Sports Performance Nutritionist at Georgia Southern, and with the Team Savannah USA Olympic Weightlifting team.

She is a member of the National Associtaion of Collegiate Women Athletic Administrators and National Academic Advising Association.



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

POST SEASON SUCCESS came for the second year in a row as UD beat La Salle in the A-10 Opening Round in Cincinnati. Kelly Keil set an A-10 Championship record for blocks by a freshman with six in the win over the Explorers.



CLOSE GAMES were the norm for the Flyers during the 2006-2007 season as 15 of their 31 games were decided by single digits including four one-point games. Kathy Guin hit a pair of game-winning three-point shots in the final seconds against Akron and Saint Joseph's.



IN RANGE FROM LONG RANGE was a theme for the Flyer offense throughout the 2006-2007 season as UD made the third most three-point shots in program history. Dayton has made a three-point shot in 189 consecutive games which leads the Atlantic 10 Conference.



NIKKI OAKLAND returned from injury to be named the Atlantic 10 Player of the Week on Dec. 23. She posted a career-high 29 points to go along with nine rebounds, four blocks and a steal in just 31 minutes against Clemson.



JENNIFER STRONG completed one of the best careers in UD history as just the eighth Flyer ever to record at least 1,000 career points and 500 career rebounds while also

starting 103 straight games.

SCORING IN BUNCHES took place during the second game of the season as Dayton beat Memphis 96-71. The 96 points were the most during a non-overtime game for the Flyers in over 20 years and tied for the most by an Atlantic 10 team all season.



KENDEL ROSS starred for the Canadian Women's National Teams over the summer. She led the U19 National team in nearly every statistical category as the team surged to a ninth place finish at the FIBA World Championships. She also helped the U21 National Team to sixth place at the FIBA Championships, which was its best finish ever.



UD ARENA



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As the University of Dayton Arena moves into its middle ages (it turned 37 on December 6, 2006), it only gets better.

In November 2002, the UD Arena re-opened after undergoing a major renovation that had been completed in a swift 10 months. Additions to the UD Arena included suites and loge seats, and the new Time Warner Cable Flight Deck -- all overlooking Blackburn Court with a powerful view of all of the action. The Boesch Lounge received a face-lift along with new restrooms and upgraded concessions for the fans. Environmental graphics were added throughout the building that tell the story of the long tradition of Dayton basketball.

Overall, the facility was modernized with an eye to the future while maintaining its steadfast roots as a landmark in the Dayton community. It also remains the crown jewel of the Arena Sports Complex that includes new baseball, football, softball and track facilities for UD's student-athletes, and the first hotel (a brand-new Courtyard By Marriott) built within the Dayton City limits in twenty years.

The Arena, built in 1969 for approximately S4.5 million without the use of public funds, has been a tremendous host site. The Flyers' win over Duquesne on February 17, 1999 was their 500th game at UD Arena and their 350th win at the venue. In the 2002-2003 season, the Flyers won their 400th game at UD Arena, going 17-1 at home, and winning the Atlantic 10 Championship on their home floor. Nationally, the Arena is better known as a host to 20 of the last 37 NCAA Tournaments. That covers 73 games, third all-time behind Kansas City's Municipal Auditorium and Salt Lake City's Huntsman Center.

During the summer of 1997, the University made two moves to forever tie the Arena with two of the greatest names in UD basketball history.

The playing court at UD Arena was named after former Flyer coach Tom Blackburn, and the \$4.5 million addition to the Arena was named for former player and coach Don Donoher. The two coaches combined for nearly 800 victories from 1947 to 1989. The playing floor is officially known as 'Tom Blackburn Court at the University of Dayton Arena,' but is referred to as 'Blackburn Court.' Blackburn coached the Flyers from 1947 until his death due to cancer in 1964. Only 58 at the time of his death, Blackburn won 352 games while being bested just 141. When he signed on at UD, the Flyers had just posted a four-win season. Four years later, his team was playing in the championship game of the most prestigious tournament of the day, the National Invitation Tournament.

The addition of the Donoher Basketball Center in 1998 was the first step in placing the facility ahead of its time. The Donoher Basketball Center, an addition to the southwest corner of the Arena, has given the Flyer basketball programs a technologically advanced facility for training, game preparation and recruiting. It now serves as the nerve center for the Flyer basketball programs, housing state-of-the-art conditioning and training rooms, locker rooms, multi-media facilities and team meeting rooms. The locker room layout incorporates an NBA-style design, combining a casually furnished lounge and meeting area within the locker room.

Named for Don Donoher at the urging of John McHale and wife, Christine Mattsson, whose \$1.25 million gift to the University initiated the projet, the Center's grand debut came on June 28, 1998. The Flyer Faithful turned out 5,000 strong to visit the open house. Donoher, who coached UD to a school-record 437 wins from 1964 to 1989, took UD to the NCAA title game in 1967 and to the NIT title the following year. He led UD to the Sweet 16 in the 1970s and then the Regional Finals in the 1980s. He also won a gold medal at the 1984 Los Angeles Olympics as an assistant coach of the U.S. team (which featured Michael Jordan).

In fact, the NCAA Final Four appearance in 1967 helped convince the UD administration of the need for the Arena. On November 7, 1968, the Rev. Raymond A. Roesch broke ground for the University of Dayton Arena. And with his first shovel of dirt, the then-UD president began a project that would help take college basketball from a game played in small gymnasiums to an event played to thousands of fans in magnificent arenas.









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UNIVERSITY OF DAYTON ARENA



The Arena opened on December 6, 1969, as the Dayton men beat Bowling Green, 72-70 (tipoff pictured above).

Since then, UD Arena has been the site of 74 men's and women's NCAA Tournament games making it the third most prolific NCAA Tournament venue in the nation.

UD Arena will host an NCAA Women's Regional for the fourth time in 2009. A little more than a year after the construction began, UD Arena was a reality. It opened on December 6, 1969, as the Flyers faced Bowling Green. BG's Jim Connally hit the Arena's first shot, followed by Dayton's first hoop, a jumper from Pat Murnen. The Flyers led 39-27 at half and pushed it to 43-27 before a 21-8 BG tear. From there, it was a dogfight. Senior (and future UD Hall of Famer) George Janky, who had 26 points and 15 rebounds, sank a pair of free throws with 29 seconds left to give UD a 72-68 lead. The Falcons' Bob Quayle hit a shot at 0:17 and then stole the inbounds pass and missed a last-second shot which would have sent it into overtime. Afterward, Jim Gottschall said, "Those two free throws George made were really something. Let's face it ... he won the game." The dedication of the Arena came at halftime of the 79-75 win over DePaul on January 17. At halftime, Ohio Governor James Rhodes told the sell-out crowd, "The Arena is an example of the University of Dayton's progressive attitude and showed it is one of the nation's leading universities in accomplishing this arena."

In the 30+ years that have passed, more than 14 million customers have witnessed events in UD Arena. In a typical year, the Arena will host more than a half-million people at more than 100 events. The level of talent that has appeared on the floor at the Arena is staggering. The list includes the likes of Kareem Abdul-Jabbar, LeBron James, Elton John, Michael Jordan, Elvis, Isiah Thomas, Adolph Rupp, David Robinson, Aerosmith, Dean Smith, Baryshnikov, Larry Bird, Johnny Cash, Magic Johnson, and Tony Gwynn (playing basketball for San Diego State). The list goes on and on.

One of a generation of great basketball arenas built in the late 1960s and early 1970s, the 13,409-seat home of Flyer basketball was the brainchild of university movers Roesch, the Rev. Charles Collins, Brother Elmer Lackner and then-Flyer Director of Athletics Thomas J. Frericks. Planning began in 1967 amid a tremendous demand for tickets to Flyer home games. Home for the games at that time was the University of Dayton Fieldhouse, which was renamed the Thomas J. Frericks Athletic and Convocation Center in 1991. Built in 1950, the then-Fieldhouse held 5,808 fans and was sold out for its last 195 Flyer games.

The Arena made NCAA men's basketball history again in March 2001 by hosting 10 post-season games in eight days, a feat never-before done in college basketball. While other venues have hosted NCAA games and games of the National Invitation Tournament in the same year, no venue or school had ever done both simultaneously. And while UD was a gracious host to nine NCAA teams, the NIT was not kind to UD opponents as the Flyers advanced to the quarterfinals for the 10th time in 19 NIT appearances.

When the NCAA Tournament expanded to 65 teams for the first time in 2001, the NCAA placed the first-ever Opening-Round Game in Dayton, featuring the tournament's 64th and 65th seeded teams, Northwestern State and Winthrop. The Opening Round was such a success in Dayton that the NCAA declared UD Arena as the Opening Round's home from 2001 through 2010. The NCAA First and Second Rounds return to the Arena in 2009 and with the completion of that series, UD Arena will pass Madison Square Garden and become the third-most prolific NCAA Tournament venue. In addition, UD hosted the Women's Basketball Regional Final in 2007 and will host again in 2010.

There are many reasons why the NCAA Tournament Committee has called on the University of Dayton Arena to be a host for so many NCAA Tournament games:

- The University had constructed a new (and large) arena in 1969, making it one of the most attractive venues in the country.
- The hometown Flyers had been so good for so long that the college basketball fans in the Miami Valley were among the most knowledgeable and supportive in the country.
- Dayton's Director of Athletics Thomas J. Frericks was an influential member of the tournament committee and a visionary regarding how to host a tournament.
- After hosting so many times, the NCAA often sent those chosen to host to Dayton, to witness the model of how to host the tournament.

Pick whatever reason you want, but there is certainly no argument that the UD Arena has been the site of more memorable NCAA Tournament moments than any facility in history. Among the Arena memories...

Notre Dame's Austin Carr scored 35 points against Ohio University -- in the first half. He added 26 more after intermission and holds the single-game mark to this day.

Adolph Rupp's Kentucky Wildcats fell to Florida State in 1972, ending his amazing career that resulted in 875 victories.

Kentucky handed Bobby Knight's Hoosiers their only loss in a two-year, 64-game span in what was called college basketball's greatest game until Christian Laettner eliminated UK in Philadelphia in 1992

The world was introduced to a magical freshman from Michigan State in 1978. But the Spartans title would wait a year as soon-to-be champ Kentucky knocked out Magic Johnson, handing him his only NCAA Tourney loss.

Mark Aguirre's agony as he gripped the ball after it had gone through the net to beat his top-ranked DePaul Blue Demons in his final collegiate game -- a loss to Saint Joseph's.

Indiana trouncing the Maryland Terrapins en route to winning the 1981 NCAA Title with sophomore Isiah Thomas leading the way in his final collegiate season.

In a simple 1984 play-in game, referee Mickey Crowley, former Supervisor of Atlantic 10 Men's Basketball Officials, ran to the ESPN announcing position to watch a replay to determine whom to send to the foul line.

One amazing day in 1985: Fairleigh Dickinson nearly beat powerful Michigan, Villanova started its dream run to the NCAA Championship (against the Dayton Flyers no less), Len Bias and Maryland stole one from Ron Harper and the Miami Redskins and David Robinson jumped into the nation's conscious as Navy decimated LSU.

One year later, another amazing freshman took to the floor in Kansas' Danny Manning while Michigan State's Scott Skiles fought and clawed his way to the regional while making a remarkable around-the-body pass on a breakaway.

Ohio State, led by Jimmy Jackson and hometown hero Mark Baker (a Dunbar High School grad), knocked out Georgia Tech and then Jackson announced that Kenny Anderson was going pro-

After going 0-3 in NCAA Tournament Games at the UD Arena, the 1995 Miami Redskins shocked the Arizona Wildcats behind the dreadlocked Devin Davis.

The North Carolina State women knocking off the top two seeds in the East -- UConn and Old Dominion -- to advance to the 1998 Final Four.

George Mason became everyone's favorite underdog by knocking off two recent national champions -- Michigan State (2000) and North Carolina (2005) -- in Dayton on the way to the 2006 Final Four.

In 2006, UD Arena became just the third venue to host 70 Men's NCAA Tournament Games -- joining Kansas City's Municipal Auditorium and Salt Lake City's Huntsman Center.

When the NCAA tournament field was expanded to 65 teams in 2000, UD Arena hosted the first-ever Opening Round Game. The Opening Round game was such a success in Dayton that the NCAA elected to hold the game at UD Arena through 2010. The 2008 Opening Round Game will be played on March 18.

In such a short time, the Opening Round Game has become one of the most exciting and entertaining games of the NCAA Tournament. In 2002, Prosper Karangwa of Siena scored 31 points to lead his Siena Saints to an 81-77 win over Alcorn State and legendary coach Davey L. Whitney. The 2003 NCAA Tournament was known for its close games and exciting finishes, and the Opening Round set the tone as UNC Asheville and Texas Southern found themselves knotted at 75-75 at the end of regulation. UNC Asheville, making its first-ever NCAA Tournament appearance, came away with a 92-84 win in overtime.

In 2003, the Women's NCAA Tournament returned to Dayton for the East Regional. Not only did the four teams who visited UD Arena feature the defending National Champion Connecticut Huskies, but also the four previous National Champions: Connecticut, who also won the title in 2000, 2001 Champion Notre Dame, and Purdue, who won it all in 1999. Connecticut survived the bracket of champions and went on to take the 2003 National Championship

The women's regional will return to the Arena in 2010. The men's First and Second Rounds are scheduled for the Arena in 2009.



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



UD is a top-tier national university and one of the 10 best Catholic universities, according to the 2007 issue of America's Best Colleges from U.S. News and World Report. The Society of Mary (Marianists), a Roman Catholic teaching order of priests and brothers, founded the University as St. Mary's School for Boys in 1850.

UD, Ohio's largest private university, embraces diversity and provides a friendly, welcoming environment for its 6,500 undergraduates and 3,500 graduate students. It offers one-of-a-kind, challenging education shaped by the Catholic, Marianist tradition, which stresses educating the whole person and linking learning and scholarship with leadership and service.

UD is increasingly popular, receiving record applications for the first-year class in five of the past six years. UD students hail from more than 45 states and 45 countries. 




A BEAUTIFUL CAMPUS

Arena Sports Complex Baseball – Softball – Track & Field – Football

Located adjacent to the UD Arena, the state-of-the-art UD Arena Sports Complex includes the \$4 million Time Warner Cable Stadium for baseball, the UD Softball Stadium, the Jerry Von Mohr Practice Field and the new Courtyard by Marriott -University of Dayton.

Baujan Field Soccer

The home of Flyer soccer features a state-of-the-art grass playing surface and terraced seating, to make it one of the nation's most unique soccer venues. Women's soccer annually ranks among the NCAA leaders in attendance.

NCR Country Club Golf (NCR South Course)

NCR's South Course has hosted the 1969 PGA Championship (won by Raymond Floyd), the 1986 U.S. Women's Open (won by Jane Geddes) and the 2005 U.S. Senior Open (won by Allen Doyle). NCR Country Club also hosts numerous local and regional PGA events and played host to the 2003 Atlantic 10 Men's Golf Championship.

Time Warner Cable Stadium Baseball

Part of the UD Arena Sports Complex, Time Warner Cable Stadium is a \$4 million home to UD Baseball. The stadium features covered chair-back seating, a press box, concessions and restrooms. Located down the right field line is an indoor hitting cage, which also includes locker rooms. The playing surface is a natural grass field with state-of-the-art drainage and irrigation.



The third-largest volleyball-only venue in the NCAA, the Frericks Center features a Sport Court surface and seating for 5,000. An extensive seating renovation and environmental graphics package was completed during the summer of 2004. The facility is named for the late Thomas J. Frericks, the Flyers' longtime Director of Athletics, and was the former home of Dayton basketball. Volleyball consistently leads the Atlantic 10 in attendance.

Welcome Stadium Football

Located adjacent to the UD Arena, the 11,000-seat Welcome Stadium features a video replay scoreboard, lights and field turf. The Flyers have won nearly 85 percent of their games at Welcome Stadium.

UD Arena **Basketball**

The crown jewel of UD's superb athletic facilities, the UD Arena is regarded as one of the nation's best college venues. A regular stop for the NCAA Tournament, UD Arena has hosted a total of 84 NCAA post season games since opening in 1969 – the third most among active venues and fourth-most alltime. UD will host the 2010 NCAA Women's Regional, 2009 NCAA Men's First and Second Rounds, and the NCAA Men's Opening Round games through 2010. The Flyer men and women both led the Atlantic 10 Conference in attendance during the 2006-'07 season.



Athletic Practice Facility (APC) Flyers Indoor Practice Facility

The newly renovated Athletic Practice Facility provides quality indoor practice space for the basketball, football, track & field, tennis, soccer, baseball and softball teams. The refurbished facility opened in January 2007, benefiting more than 350 Flyers student-athletes. By adding the additional practice space, UD teams gain flexibility to train and practice. The improved facilities will decrease injuries, lessen travel time for student-athletes and serve as a great recruiting tool for Dayton. It enables the Flyers to simultaneously enhance the student-athlete experience and competitive performance.



The Donoher Basketball Center

The University of Dayton dedicated its state-of-the-art Donoher Basketball Center at the UD Arena on June 19, 1998. While the name gives away the fact it is a great asset for Flyer basketball (Don Donoher is the winningest men's basketball coach in UD history), it has also become the home for Flyer football.

The Center nearly doubled the amount of space previously available for the team, and includes a spacious locker room, coaches' room, training room and equipment room. As part of the cutting-edge technology included in the Center, UD utilize the cutting edge video editing equipment called Digital Sports Video.

DANIEL J. CURRAN



Daniel J. Curran is president of the University of Dayton, recognized as a top-tier national university and one of the 10 best Catholic universities in the country. The Philadelphia native became the University of Dayton's 18th president and first lay leader on July 1, 2002.

Dr. Curran is guiding the University of Dayton through transformational times. A new master plan will shape development on a campus that now spans to the Great Miami River. A new strategic plan will focus on strengthening the school's distinctive Catholic and Marianist identity, diversifying the student body, internationalizing the curriculum, hiring nationally prominent faculty and building upon a learning-living environment that supports academic excellence.

Under Dr. Curran's leadership, the University of Dayton has enjoyed a 15 percent jump in first-year applications, record sponsored research dollars, increased national recognition — and tremendous momentum.

In the past five years, the University started new exchange programs in China, established centers of excellence in nanotechnology and fuels and combustion, opened the Science Center and Innovation Center, built a sports complex, launched the nation's first accelerated low curriculum and started a doctor of physical therapy program. In addition, UD opened the Dayton Early College Academy, a public high school on compus that prepares first-generation college students to earn a high school diploma and college credits at the same time. In the residential arena, UD constructed two facilities that combine living and learning — Marianist Hall, a residence hall with learning spaces, and ArtStreet, an imaginative housing and arts education complex in the University neighborhood. RecPlex, an ultramodern fitness and recreation complex, opened in 2006.

In addition, UD teamed with commercial developers on two ventures: University Place, a two-story mixed-use development on the corner of Brown and Stewart streets that will include graduate apartments and retail outlets, and Courtyard by the Marriott at the University of Dayton, a hotel near UD Arena. As part of Citirama 2007, the Dayton Homebuilders Association built a five-house townhouse and renovated another four houses in the student neighborhood.

Beyond the physical changes, the University of Dayton has grown in national stature under Dr. Curran's leadership. A 2006 survey ranks UD first among Catholic universities and third overall for community revitalization initiatives. UD places second nationally in the amount of materials research it performs annually, according to the National Science Foundation. In the classroom, the entrepreneurship program ranks fifth in the nation, according to Entrepreneur magazine and The Princeton Review.

As a member of the National Collegiate Athletic Association's Division I board of directors, Dr. Curran helped shape academic reforms designed to improve the graduation rate of student-athletes. He has been named to its executive committee and Division I-AA/I-AAA Presidential Advisory Group. His other national board memberships include the Higher Learning Commission, part of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools.

In the Dayton region, he focuses on economic development and high-tech issues. He chairs the Wright Brothers Institute board and serves on nearly two dozen others, including the Dayton Development Coalition, Dayton Area Chamber of Commerce, National Composite Center and Miami Valley Research Foundation. In the state, the governor tapped him for the Ohio Aerospace and Advisory Council. The Dayton Development Coalition named Curran the Dayton region's most outstanding volunteer citizen for 2006 for his efforts in securing more than \$55 million in Ohio Third Frontier Project grants for the Miami Valley.

Colleagues praise him for his forward-thinking approach, dedication to the Marianist mission, energy, approachability and strong commitment to social justice.

A sociologist by training, Dr. Curran spent 23 years in various administrative and faculty positions at Saint Joseph's University in Philadelphia, most recently as executive vice president and vice president for academic affairs. He's a noted scholar in criminology, juvenile justice and social problems, with a deep interest in international issues.

His passion for social justice runs deep. At his presidential installation ceremony in April 2003, he noted that a Catholic university must be "a force for social change. As a community of learners and educators, we must analyze the causes of social injustice and educate professionals with a conscience."

He serves on the board of the Ohio Children's Defense Fund. In 2005, he joined University of Dayton students on a relief trip to hurricane-stricken Mississippi. In 2002, he received the Eternal Flame Award, an international award given for "exceptional contribution to the field of Holocaust education."

Most of Dr. Curran's research has focused on ways to address social inequality. His prolific scholarly record includes eight books, most of which he co-authored with his wife, Claire M. Renzetti, a sociology professor at the University of Dayton. Theories of Crime: A Reader was published in 2003 and is now available in Polish and Czech. The two are working on updated editions of Women, Men and Society: The Sociology of Gender and Social Problems: Society in Crisis. In 1993, the University of Pittsburgh Press published his Dead Laws for Dead Men, a historical analysis of coal mine health and safety legislation.

Before becoming a vice president at Saint Joseph's University, Dr. Curran served as dean of the College of Arts and Sciences for four years. He started his academic career there in 1979 with a series of faculty positions in the department of sociology, including chair from 1988 to 1992. As a professor of sociology, he has taught courses in criminology, social problems, juvenile justice and white-collar crime. Dr. Curran also served as president of the faculty senate at Saint Joseph's University.

In 1990, he served as a Fulbright Senior Scholar at the University of Melbourne in Australia. He held a concurrent professorship at Nanjing University in China.

Dr. Curran earned a Ph.D. from the University of Delaware in 1980 after receiving a master's degree from Temple University in 1978 and a bachelor's degree from Saint Joseph's University in 1973 — all in sociology. Dr. Curran and his wife, Claire, have two sons, Sean and Aidan.

VICE-PRESIDENT/ DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

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The University of Dayton Athletics Division reflects the mission of the university by using the laboratory of fields of play and arenas of competition to educate young people. The guiding principles of this mission and the division goals are under the watchful eye of Vice President/Director of Athletics, Ted Kissell.

Kissell begins his 16th year as Vice President/Director of Athletics at the University of Dayton. Only the sixth AD in school history, Kissell is charged with the oversight of 17 intercollegiate athletics programs, the University of Dayton Arena and the surrounding Arena Sports Complex.

Under Kissell's leadership, University of Dayton Athletics has been transformed into a widelysuccessful broad-based program. Since 1998, UD has had 24 conference championships and had 17 teams reach the post-season. In the nine years prior, the Flyers had only seven conference championships and one tournament appearance.

The progress of the men's basketball program in the last eight years toward greater national prominence has been marked by three NCAA bids, two NIT bids and an average of more than 20 wins a season. This success has provided resources that allowed the annual operating budget to grow nearly \$10 million to support Kissell's strategy of building broad-based competitive results throughout Flyer sports programs. Women's soccer has earned five NCAA tournament appearances (including a berth in the "Sweet Sixteen" in 2001) and has won eight of the last 11 A-10 regular season championships. Women's volleyball has earned three NCAA tournament appearances and has won eight A-10 titles (regular season and/or tournament). Men's soccer has won four A-10 titles. The baseball team's record for wins in a season was 25 after the 2000 campaign — since then UD has won at least 30 games four times. UD football gained nationwide attention with 29 consecutive winning seasons and taking home the 2002 NCAA Division I-AA Mid-Major National Championship.

Strong performance on the field has not come at the expense of a high level of performance in the classroom. The Hypers' combined cumulative grade point average has steadily risen during Kissell's tenure. Flyer student-athletes currently carry a cumulative GPA over 3.0 and in April 2007, the NCAA Graduation Success Rate report placed UD first in the Atlantic 10 and tied for sixth nationally of more than 325 Division I institutions for graduating its student-athletes.

UD's athletic facilities are second to none. During his 16 years, upgrading and developing better playing facilities were key components to the Kissell's overall strategy to provide strong, positive experiences and support for student-athletes. The 25-acre Arena Sports Complex is not only home to baseball, softball, track & field, but also provides a grass practice field for Flyer football. The complex serves as an attractive southern gateway to the city of Dayton. Upgrades to Baujan Field and the UD Arena during this past decade provide opportunities for exciting sporting events. The Athletics Practice Facility (formerly the Physical Activities Center) is being renovated to provide much needed indoor practice space for more than 400 Flyer student-athletes. The Collins Gymnasium now serves as the indoor practice home for all of UD's outdoor sports, and the conversion of the Lackner Natatorium to a dedicated basketball-only practice facility will be completed by the 2007-08 academic year. The new and upgraded facilities have been accomplished through effective fundraising. Under Kissell's leadership, the Athletics Division has raised over S30 million for capital projects since 2000.


The Arena upgrades have kept it one of the best places to watch an NCAA tournament game. The 75 NCAA games held at UD Arena rank it third among sites for the men's tournament. Since Kissell came to UD, the Arena has hosted 31 NCAA men's games, three women's regionals and the two most successful Atlantic 10 basketball tournaments in league history.

A native of Chicago, Kissell holds two history degrees - a B.A. from Elmhurst College in 1969 and an M.A. from Northern Illinois University in 1972. Ted's family includes his wife Deanna, four children - Ted Jr., Jennifer, Sarah and Katie, and three grandsons: Teo, Gabriel, and Jack.

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UD ADMINISTRATION

ASSOCIATE VICE PRESIDENT FOR ATHLETICS



A former Flyer student-athlete himself, Tim Wabler joined the University of Dayton Athletics Division as an administrator in 1993. As UD's Associate Vice-President for Athletics, Wabler's primary duties include the administration of all of UD's sports programs and support services.

In the last decade Wabler has been part of the Dayton Athletics Division, the Flyers have experienced significantly improved competitive success. In the last ten years, UD has had 24 conference championships and 17 teams reach the post-season. In the nine years prior to that, the Flyers only had seven conference championships and one tournament

As success on the field has improved, UD student-athletes have also performed in the classroom. The Flyers' combined cumulative grade point average has risen to be above 3.0. UD has had 27 Academic All-Americans in the last six years. Only Nebraska, Rensselaer Poly and Rice had more. The Flyers had three Arthur Ashe Scholar-Athletes in 2005-06, the most in school history. Dayton is consistently among the league leaders in placing student-athletes on the Atlantic 10 Commissioner's Honor Roll, even though the Flyers participate in fewer A-10 sports than all but one school. UD had the most players on the PFL Academic Honor Roll for the sixth straight year in 2006.

Wabler managed the implementation of a gender equity plan that provides men and women student-athletes with equitable opportunities in line with the university's general population. A U.S. News & World Report ranks UD in the top 15 in Division I gender equity. Additionally, the Athletics Division has worked with the University to implement an aggressive program to increase minority opportunities

 $Wabler is \ overseeing \ the \ Athletics' \ Division \ efforts \ to \ provide \ top-notch \ facilities \ for \ the \ next \ generation$ of Flyer student-athletes with the creation of the Arena Sports Complex. Development of the Arena Sports Complex began with a \$13 million renovation to the University of Dayton Arena, completed in 2002. Since then, the University has added a running track, the Jerry Von Mohr Football Practice Field, Time Warner Cable Stadium for baseball and a new softball stadium. The most recent addition was the Courtyard by Marriott at the University of Dayton that opened during the 2006-07school year.

UD's on-campus venues — Baujan Field, the Frericks Center, and locker rooms for teams that call those places home -- have also benefited from the initiative. The latest step forward on campus is the renovation of the Athletics Practice Facility (formerly the Physical Activities Center) to provide much needed indoor practice space for more than 400 Flyer student-athletes. The Collins Gymnasium now serves as the indoor practice home for all of UD's outdoor sports, and the conversion of the Lackner Natatorium to a dedicated basketball-only practice facility will be completed by the 2007-08 academic year.

Including the Arena Seating Plan, gifts to Athletics total over \$4.5 million annually. Wabler, a Dayton native, is in charge of all coaches' contracts for the Athletics Division, and manages radio and TV agreements. Wabler is also the administrator who oversees UD's athletic fund-raising efforts and longterm finances. Radio and television agreements have been expanded to increase exposure for Flyer

Wabler has been actively involved in numerous A-10 Conference committees, including the Championships Review Committee, Baseball Committee and Soccer Committee.

His committee work also extends to service to the University community. He currently serves on UD's Campus Master Planning Committee, and has been a past member of UD's Committee on Diversity in Community and Resource Allocation Steering Committee. Wabler is also an NCAA Peer Reviewer and a member of the Greater Dayton YMCA's Board of Trustees.

A 1974 graduate of UD's School of Business Administration, Wabler has also completed the Sports Management Institute Executive Program. A former member of UD's Athletic Board, Wabler was a four-year letterwinner and three-time Pitcher of the Year for UD. He served as team captain as a senior. Tim and his wife Arlene have two daughters, Sarah and Leigh Anne.

ASSISTANT DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS/ SENIOR WOMAN ADMINISTRATOR



A part of University of Dayton athletics since 2000, Dawn Mamula was named UD's Senior Woman Administrator in the summer of 2007. Mamula brings external and internal administrative experiences, as well as those of a student-athlete and coach to the role of SWA.

Her first position with the Flyers was as the Director of Ticketing Services at the University of Dayton Arena. After two years at the Arena, she moved into athletic administration where she manages the division's finances as well as athletics communications. Since then, her duties have expanded to include serving as the sport program

administrator for women's soccer and softball and oversight of academic affairs, as well as studentathlete welfare issues and the student-athlete life skills program.


A three-sport athlete in high school, the New Philadelphia, Ohio native played two seasons of collegiate tennis at Otterbein College before injuries ended her career. She was a member of two Ohio Athletic Conference championship teams, and was an OAC champion and runner-up at #2 singles and #1 doubles. She was first team all-conference in both of her seasons at Otterbein.

In addition to her administrative experience, Mamula was an assistant tennis coach at Otterbein before coming to UD, and also took over the Dayton women's tennis program for one season as interim head coach. She guided the Flyers to a sixth-place finish at the 2005 Atlantic 10 Championships, matching UD's second-best finish.

A 1998 graduate of Otterbein with a Bachelor's in Business Administration, Mamula earned her Master's in Sport Management from The Ohio State University in 2005. She is currently pursuing her doctorate in Sport Management at OSU where her research interests will be focused on intercollegiate athletics. In addition, Mamula is an adjunct professor in UD's Health and Sport Science department, teaching courses in sport finance.

Mamula is the chair of the Atlantic 10 Women's Soccer Committee, and a member of the A-10 Women's Tennis Committee and the A-10 Championships and Equity Committee. She is a member of the Collegiate Athletic Business Managers Association, the National Association of Collegiate Women Athletic Administrators and the College Sports Information Directors of America.

FACULTY ATHLETICS REPRESENTATIVE



Dr. Michael O'Hare. Professor of Physics and Professor of Electro-Optics, was named faculty representative to the NCAA in 1998. Dr. O'Hare has been in the Department of Physics at the University of Dayton since 1966 and served as chair of the department from 1983 to 2007. Dr. O'Hare has taught physics at all levels and has research experience in atomic, molecular, solid-state and optical physics.

He has served as a consultant and visiting scientist to the Wright-Patterson Air Force Materials Laboratory. Most recently, Dr. O'Hare was a co-principal investigator on a NASA sponsored NOVA grant to design curricula for developing scientific literacy in preservice teachers.

Dr. O'Hare's duties as faculty representative to the NCAA include: taking an active role in the institutional control of the intercollegiate athletics program; representing a faculty viewpoint and faculty oversight and advice in the administration of the athletics program; involvement in the assurance of academic integrity of the athletics program and the maintenance of the welfare of the student-athletes; and monitoring of performance of the student-athletes.

Dr. O'Hare and his late wife, Patricia, have four daughters, all of whom graduated from the University of

SUPPORT SERVICES

WEEKLY MEETINGS

Academic Coordinators hold weekly meetings with student-athletes to assess how they are performing in their course work and to emphasize time management, study skills, organization, and goal setting as well as provide an opportunity to communicate athletic and/or personal issues.

ACADEMIC MONITORING

Academic coordinators closely monitor the academic progress of student athletes. In addition to freshmen midterm grades reported by the university, progress reports are issued to professors to ensure that attendance, effort and progress are maintained.

STUDY HALL

Study Hall is a structured, monitored, and quiet environment in which studentathletes have the opportunity to develop consistent and appropriate study skills. Computer and wireless access are available as well as the opportunity to meet with tutors. Coaches are notified on a regular basis regarding study hall attendance and behavior.

ADVISING

In addition to university assigned academic advisors, Academic Coordinators are assigned to specific athletic teams and are responsible for providing academic support to all student-athletes. Coordinators compliment the University's academic advisors by assisting in academic advising, counseling, and monitoring. Academic coordinators ensure that student-athletes follow NCAA, Atlantic 10 and University of Dayton guidelines.

CAMPUS COLLABORATION

Academics works closely with the LEAD office on campus to provide students with tutoring and disability support services. The intent of the tutorial program is to provide academic assistance in areas that include review of class discussion and notes, study strategies, and other information that is imperative to the respective class, while services from DSS include adaptive technology, extended test time, and note-taking

FAST FACTS

- Since 1999, UD is one of only 10 schools who have maintained a graduation rate of at least 85 percent.
- According to the 2006 NCAA Graduation Success Rate report, UD graduated 96 percent of its student-athletes who began their careers between 1996 and 1999.
- At least one Dayton student-athlete has been named an Academic All-American for 22 straight years.
- For the fall 2006 semester, 127 student-athletes made the Dean's List and 19 earned a 4.00 GPA.



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NCAA COMPLIANCE

What is a prospective student-athlete/"prospect"?

A prospect is any student who has started classes for the ninth (9th) grade, any student who receives financial assistance or other benefits from UD and/or its athletics representative that are not normally provided to prospective students generally.

You become a "recruited prospective student-athlete" at a particular college if any coach or representative of the college's athletics interests (booster or representative) approaches you (or any member of your family) about enrolling and participating in athletics at that college. Activities by coaches or boosters that cause you to become a recruited prospective student-athlete are:

- · Providing you with an official visit*
- Placing more than one telephone call to you or any other member of your family
- Visiting you or any other member of your family anywhere other than the college campus
- * You may take a maximum of five "official visits" with no more than one to any single institution

NCAA Compliance - The NCAA and You

The University of Dayton is committed to the principle of institutional control in operating its athletics program in a manner that is consistent with the letter and spirit of NCAA, conference and university rules and regulations. The University's commitment is to maintain control of its athletics programs through cooperation between responsible administrators, coaches, faculty, all institutional staff members, studentathletes and representatives of the University's athletics interests.

Who are UD Athletics Representatives/Boosters*?

- Any current and former member of any UD Athletics Division fan support group
- Any contributor to UD Athletics or booster group members
- Season ticket holders
- Anyone who has helped arrange employment or employed a cur rent or prospective student-athlete
- Anyone who has been involved, in any way, in the promotion of Flyer Athletics
 - *Please note: Once you become an athletics representative, you retain that identity indefinitely.

What are Extra Benefits?

An extra benefit is any special arrangement by a UD staff member or an athletics representative to provide a prospective or enrolled studentathlete or his/her family with a benefit not specifically authorized by NCAA regulations. Impermissible extra benefits would include, but are not limited to:

- Cash or loans of any amount
- Co-signing or arranging a loan
- Gifts or discounted/free services (e.g., airline tickets, merchandise, etc.)
- Rent-free or reduced-cost housing
- Employment of a student-athlete at a rate higher than wages paid for similar work
- Payment to a student-athlete for work not performed

Sports Medicine

SPORTS MEDICINE STAFF

At the University of Dayton, the health and well being of our student-athletes is a primary concern. We strive to prevent injuries through pre-participation physical examinations, well-designed conditioning programs, warm-ups, proper practice planning, and appropriate equipment selection. When an athletic injury occurs, our goal is to provide the best medical care possible from the initial first-aid to the follow-up care and rehabilitation.

FACILITIES

There are two Athletic Training Rooms in operation at the University of Dayton. The Arena Training Room is located in the Donoher Basketball Center and utilized by Arena Complex teams for practices and games. The Frericks Center training room is open year round and is utilized for treatment and rehabilitation to all sports in the mornings and serves those sports that operate out of the Frericks Center in the afternoon.

STAFF

The University of Dayton Sports Medicine Staff consists of a team of Family Practice Physicians and Orthopedic Consultants and four full-time and two graduate assistant certified and licensed Athletic Trainers. In particular instances the Head Team Physician may refer athletes to other physicians or specialists. However, the Head Team Physician supervises the status of all athletes referred to other physicians or specialists and has the final authority with regard to all medical disqualifications, treatment, and return to play. Referrals to specialists will be made through the Team Physicians or Athletic Trainers only.

Trained personnel are present at all athletic contests and, where possible, at all practices to insure prompt medical attention. The Sports Medicine Staff works closely with the coaching staff to keep them informed regarding the medical status of the athletes.



TIM QUINN, M.D. ORTHOPEDIC CONSULTANT

Former Flyer football standout Dr. Tim Quinn serves his alma mater as the orthopedic consultant for UD Athletics. A 1973 graduate, Quinn has been associated with the Flyers in this capacity since 1988. He was a two-time First Team Academic All-America, and was chosen a National Football Foundation/College Football Hall of Fame Scholar-Athlete in 1972. A versatile player, he was a starter at linebacker and on the defensive line in his career. He is also a two-time winner of UD's John L. Macbeth Memorial Scholar-Athlete Award.

Quinn received his medical degree from Ohio State in 1976, and then received a fellowship to study at the International College of Surgeons in London, England. He is a Fellow of the American Academy of Orthopedic Surgeons, and a member of the Orthopedic Society for Sports Medicine and Arthroscopy Association of North America.

Quinn's father Joe played and coached football at UD, and is a member of UD's Athletic Hall of Fame. The Quinn family — Tim, his father Joe, his brother Dan and his uncle Fran — combined for 14 football letters. Dr. Quinn has been an orthopedic surgeon in Dayton since 1981.





SEAN CONVERY, M.D. HEAD PHYSICIAN

Dr. Sean Convery is in his seventh year heading up Dayton's medical staff. Convery's primary full-time position is serving as the medical director of The Sports Medicine Center at Miami Valley Hospital in Dayton. In addition, he is a faculty member in the Family Practice Residency Program at Miami Valley Hospital; associate clinical professor in the Department of Family Practice at Wright State University School of Medicine; school physician for the Kettering City School District; and team physician at Kettering Fairmont High School.

Convery is past president of the Miami Valley Academy of Family Practice and serves as Montgomery County Medical Association delegate to the Ohio State Medical Association. He is a member of the American College of Sports Medicine and a charter member of the American Medical Society for Sports Medicine. Convery is active within the Dayton community, having been involved as a volunteer physician for the Nike Tour, Jingle Bell Run for Arthritis, Dayton River Corridor Classic and Special Olympics.

A 1977 summa cum laude graduate of the University of Steubenville in Steubenville, Ohio, Convery holds a Bachelor of Arts in chemistry. He is a 1981 graduate of the Wright State University School of Medicine. He is a board certified family practice physician with additional certification in sports medicine.

Strength & Conditioning



STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING

State-of-the-art conditioning centers, fully-equipped training rooms and full-time professionals combine to create a program for student-athletes that give them a physical edge over the competition. Each UD team has a plan designed and administered by qualified professionals to meet the specific needs of their sport and style of play. All student-athletes perform basic strength training with a general emphasis on explosive lifts that involve as much of the body as possible. Conditioning programs are designed to prepare student-athletes for the specific metabolic demands of their sport. Core training, agility work and sport specific exercises are then incorporated into each program to prepare each student-athlete for competitive success.

The UD strength and conditioning coaches work with our sports medicine staff to help reduce the risk of injuries and to efficiently return student-athletes to competition as quickly and as safely as possible following injury. With four staff members holding the Certified Strength and Conditioning Specialist (CSCS) credential, UD stays current on the latest research to insure that our programs are among the best in the country. In addition, the UD strength and conditioning staff can provide assistance in eating strategies that will improve the health and competitiveness of UD student-athletes. The University of Dayton athletic conditioning centers, located both in the Frericks Center and the Donoher Basketball Center, house the very latest treadmills, Nautilus equipment and free weights.



MEDIA CREDENTIALS

Credentials are issued to accredited members of the media by Bill Thomas in the Athletics Communication Office (937-229-4419) at least 24 hours prior to each game. Media passes will be picked up at the media entrance gate, next to the loading dock in the back of the UD Arena.

PHOTO CREDENTIALS

Photo passes for Flyer games will be issued by the Athletics Communication Office to accredited members of the media only. All requests must be made at least 24 hours prior to each home game. Still photographers are restricted to the right side of the basket at either end of the floor (per NCAA Tournament guidelines) unless prior arrangements are made with Bill Thomas in the Athletics Communication Office (937-229-4419). Also, no flash photography is permitted unless approved in advance.

PRESS ROOM SERVICES

The basketball press room is located beneath the administrative offices at the UD Arena. It can be reached via the ramp that connects the outside to courtside. Team information, game programs, and starting lineups with game officials will be available before the game. Halftime stats will be delivered to press row at intermission and a full NCAA box with play-by-play will be furnished to members of the working press. Coaches' quotes and possibly featuredplayer quotes (depending on the game) will also be made available. This information will be available about 30 minutes following each home game at www.DaytonFlyers.com.

POST GAME FILING

Fax service is available at the Arena. The press room will be equipped with three telephones available on a first-come, first-served basis. Persons requiring telephones at courtside should order phones through Bill Thomas in the Athletics Communication Office (937-229-4419).

Those ordering phone service directly through UD Telcomm cannot be guaranteed courtside placement. Accessible wireless internet is available at courtside and in the media work room.

PRESS ROW

Press row is located courtside, opposite the team benches and scorers' table. Seating is limited and reserved for WORKING MEDIA ONLY. An emergency courtside phone line is briefly available during games. There are phone lines available in the press room. The press row number is (937) 449-2855. An auxiliary press area is in Section 301.

MEDIA PARKING

Windshield passes admitting cars into the arena parking lot will be provided upon request and availability. Media parking is reserved at the back of the UD Arena, near the loading dock. Please enter at Gate B and have your pass displayed.

NCAA TOURNAMENT CREDENTIAL POLICY

According to NCAA regulations, media wishing to be credentialed for the 2008 NCAA Tournament must meet NCAA guidelines and must attend 90 percent of Flyer home games.




